
From Sue MacTavish, District Librarian - July 2019 featured item:

Does your temple need an overhaul?

"This letter is from John, the elder, to my dear friend, Gaius whom I love in the truth. Dear friend, I pray that you may enjoy good health and that all may go well with you even as your soul is getting well." (3 John 1:1-2)

This letter was written about 90 years after the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. John writes Gaius encouraging him and the early church to continue to offer hospitality as well as to address those who do not reflect God's values. This letter from John addresses not only the church's spiritual health ("...as your soul is getting better...) but physical health as well: ("...that you may enjoy good health....")

After searching more scripture about how God addresses the importance of our physical health, I was so encouraged to see that I Corinthians also addresses His concern about our physical health in reference to our "Temples" in I Corinthians 3:16-17. These passages address Paul's question to the church. He asks a question which defines more about who we are in Christ and gives us even more information about God's concern about our physical health. Paul asks: "Don't you know that you yourselves are God's temple and that God's Spirit lives in you? If anyone destroys God's temple, God will destroy him for God's temple is sacred and YOU ARE THAT TEMPLE. Wow! Enough said! It doesn't seem that John could be any more clear than that!



We, as Christians, traditionally teach, preach, talk about and instruct on how to be ministers who are spiritually healthy. We, however, tend to neglect the physical aspects of our health which is also directly related to taking care of our "Temples". Are we responsible for some of the destruction of our "Temples" by not taking good care of our bodies? Could many of our illnesses and diseases be prevented by taking better care of ourselves spiritually and physically? God deliberately designed our bodies to function in a certain way and it is important that we understand and honor this. It is very important that we make every effort to keep the design that he created. Genesis 1:26-31 reminds us how majestically God created each of us: "God created man in His own image, in the image of God He created him; male and female He created them...God saw that all that he had made, and it was very good..." God wants us to be strong spiritually and physically so we may serve Him and each other. Genesis also addresses that God made specific provisions for us so that we may be spiritually and physically well. He wants us to be able to enjoy the life he has provided for us here on this earth while we are

As God has recently answered my personal prayers for healing, He has revealed to me that He wants me to grow more spiritually close to Him. He also revealed that there are some things I need to do to repair and maintain my "Temple" as He moves me along in the ministry that he wills for me. I am called to share this with you. We are all called by God to be ministers in our own special way. He asks all of us to do our best to take care of our Temples.

In our culture that pushes us from one minute to the next, we find ourselves attempting to live 36 hours of activity in the 24 hours that God gave us. We live blindly and without sensitivity to the anxiety, stress and frustration that this causes and then wonder why we have illnesses and diseases. Much of the time many of us, including me, are living this stress and anxiety and we are not even aware of it. God, Himself, took a break and rested on the seventh day after He created the world that He continues to provide for us.

Does your "Temple" need an overhaul? For those of us who experience this all too often; let us stop and consider taking the time to have an "on purpose" conversation with God and listen to what God is telling us about how to take care of our temples. The following may be a good list to get started with as we have this conversation. The following list includes some of my conversations with God; conversations with medical experts; conversations with other Christians who are exploring what God is revealing to them about how to take care of their temples.

- 1. Prayer: asking God to reveal how to obtain good physical health (and spiritual health), repair, maintain or continue good health for your "Temple".
- 2. Rest: Even God rested on the Sabbath. Are you and your family observing Sabbath as a day of rest? Are you getting enough rest in your diet?
- 3. Stress/Anxiety: CAN KILL!!!
 - Do you consider delegating some of your responsibilities to others?
 - Do you consider letting go of activities if they are not producing fruit?
- 4. Do you ask your medical experts about best diets for you?
 - Do you ask your medical experts for nutrition education for your "Temple" that promotes health?
 - Do you talk with your medical experts about drinking enough water?
- 5. Do you have a difficult time saying "no" when opportunities seem to appear for you?
 - Not every opportunity that appears is necessarily the will of God for you. Sometimes we may say "yes" to an opportunity to please others and not necessarily God.
- 6. Are you exercising?
 - Are you talking with your medical experts about the right amount of exercise recommended for your "Temple"?
- 7. Are you getting enough sleep in your diet?
- Do you relax?

God calls all of us to minister. Each one of us has a God given ministry. In order to minister according to God's will we must be ready spiritually and physically. It is never too late to start to have these conversations first with God and perhaps with your own medical experts. Remember that God did not create us to be "busy." He created us to be fruitful. Amen.



Rev. Gordon Meriwether and the Rev. Dr. Victor Gómez attended the Latino Caucus Thursday night, June 20th.




Joe Amend, our District Lay Leader, and Victor Gómez, our District Superintendent, represented our district well!

The Harrisonburg District is sponsoring a special event to be held at Manor Memorial UMC, New Market. The Aldersgate Renewal Ministries (ARM) will be providing the leadership and teaching this event. ARM equips local churches to minister to the world in the power of the Holy Spirit. Volunteers who are trained by ARM go to churches to provide teaching and group facilitation. Mary O. Jones of Front Royal, will be our ARM Coordinator and lead "Lord, Teach Us to Pray" with her volunteer team of 4 or 5 volunteers. This event is "designed to encourage God's people to become people of prayer." Mary was trained shortly after the "Lord, Teach Us to Pray" seminar was created and has successfully led many of these events.



From Friday evening through Saturday evening, October 4-5, 2019, the vision is to have each participant grow and/or establish a vibrant prayer life by employing various tools and teaching to be offered and energized by the Power of the Holy Spirit. The event will be open to all who wish to grow in their relationship with God through prayer. This event has the potential to change lives and to transform churches as participants are challenged to walk in intimacy with God through prayer. 



We always are in need of donations of medical equipment, especially shower benches and rollators (walkers with seats for resting). These are always appreciated and at times we buy needed equipment with your monetary donations. We welcome volunteers for the hours we are open and also to help in delivering and setting up hospital beds. Please call Delores Reid, 540-383-6112, if you are interested or have questions or need equipment. Let your neighbors know we have medical equipment to loan and disposables (adult dia-

pers, pull-ups, dressing supplies, etc.) to give to those who need these items. We serve Harrisonburg and the surrounding counties, so spread the word.

Kingsway Prison and Family Outreach has a birthday card mailing list of over 1500 inmates statewide. These are men and women who have attended church services or bible studies at one of the prisons where it is offered on a regular basis. Some have moved on to another facility within the state but remain on the list, so this means we send out about 25 cards a week. 

Kids Soar received 1,324 books at Annual Conference and the 5K According to the Roanoke District, "They were overwhelmed, with joy, as the heart of their program is literacy!!" One annual conference member brought 12 boxes from the school where she teaches, as her fellow teachers donated books.
