## From Your District Superintendent

On October 6, 1774, John Wesley met with those of the society who had votes in the ensuing election, and advised them the following:

To vote, without fee or reward, for the person they judged most worthy.

To speak no evil of the person they voted against, and

To take care their spirits were not sharpened against those that voted on the other side.

As elections are upon us, it saddens me to see the way people treat one another. I am astonished at the way people speak to one another. I am discouraged at the attacks I see, and I am disgusted at the hatred shown to others simply because folks don't agree with "our" candidate. Certainly, the church is being polarized by what is taking place in politics, and we are mean to each other.

During charge conferences, I read a meditation written by Terry Teykl from a devotional booklet titled: "Praying the Lord's Prayer at Noon." In this devotional booklet, we are reminded of today's cultural rhetoric that aims to invert the very definitions of right and wrong, good and evil, honor and scorn, truth and deceit. It also reminds us that as Christians, we have been given the mind of Christ here and now. We are reminded that we must stand firm on the truths and reality of kingdom thinking.

Many of us will exercise our right and duty to cast our vote; I already did. As Christians and as God's church, we know we are better than the discourse that is taking place. We must set a good example as we have been given the mind of Christ. Vote your conscious, vote your values, and vote your principles, then follow the three advices from John Wesley, and pray for one another, and finally share God's love with one another. I also invite you to join Bishop Lewis in fasting and prayer for the healing of the nation from October 31 - November 2.

## From the District Director of Congregational Vitality - Gordon Meriwether

#### Is This Where I Sign Up?

In this time of exhaustion and turmoil, let us "Make every effort to live in peace with all men and to be holy; without holiness no one will see the Lord." (Hebrews 12: 14)

In my upbringing, going to church was a requirement, not to fulfill the call to holiness necessarily, but rather to complete the checklist for qualifications of salvation. Nothing came of this mandated presence other than my mother's familia satisfaction of compliance with church dogma. But as is usual in the presence of God, where grace flows, holy accidents were bound to happen....so happened holiness.

In the 60's, outside the church the cultural upheaval in the cause of social justice, protests against the Vietnam War, the supporting draft, and rapidly changing morality provided more than enough confusion to derail the most stable of my futurist plans. Unlike my friends and family, I could never put to bed the search for meaning of life, or realize a direction with consistent purpose, or, for that matter, understand the calling that burned in my very soul. All through my younger days and professional career, the desires of the Spirit taunted me with the resolve of a hungry mosquito. I floated through denomination after denomination, with brief spiritual diversions into Buddhism and Taoism, always in search of the answer to my question of Divine purpose.

Then in 1985, I literally stumbled out of a Presbyterian Church into Messiah UMC in Northern Virginia and a mentor named Rev. Ray Chamberlain. I didn't realize it at the time, but Ray and the brothers and sisters of this Methodist congregation were together building the foundation for my holiness quest, filling in the spiritual holes, and loading me for the ministry. Through days of teaching and outreach, and pastoral care, I learned the rhythms of my heart and soul. I clearly heard the calling that had haunted my spirit; the call to ministry. Yet maturing as a follower of Christ through seminary and ministry, I somehow missed the "class" on holiness. I heard it in the wisdom of my instructors, in the preaching of my elders, and in the readings of long ago scholars, yet it didn't click. Even the stories of Wesley and The Holy Club didn't inspire me. Then, in the midst of this modern crisis of the spirit, I tripped and fell at the foot of the Throne in the shadow of the Cross with only the grace of God to lift me, realizing then that holiness was missing in action. Disgruntled and frustrated, I called out for mercy and understanding only to be advised by a family friend, the retired Anglican Bishop of Malawi, "So, Gordon, where is holiness in all this?"

My Lord, for years I have called out for Christian Perfection as my life goal, unashamedly, without hesitation....this is the quest I chase! But those are just the words of my past affirmations. Now I see, my God, that without Grace, which is <u>Your gift</u> to me, and Holiness which is <u>my gift</u> to you, I will never reach Christian Perfection. I will fall back to the checklist of old, to qualify somewhere between a good man and a good Christian man.

THE HOLY CLUB No, Lord, that's not what we are called to be or do as ministers of the Word. Without striving for and embracing this Holiness, we will never achieve our goal for Christian Perfection. And this is not a proper ending for this book of life that we now scribe. So, let us take a page from our brothers at Oxford many years ago, who banded together to do God's work among the down trodden and dismissed, and do likewise under the Grace of God and the Holiness in our times, as members of this **The Holy Club**.

My brother and sisters, we need each other to complete our quest to Christian Perfection. We need to listen to our shared lessons and good counsel. So, let us once again join together in this **Holy Club** in this sacred journey of Grace and Holiness.

"Just as he who called you is holy, so be holy in all you do; for it is written: 'be holy, because I am holy."" (1 Peter 1: 15-16)



through with a thematic reading plan. The thematic plan is found on www.intentionalbygrace.com and Bishop Lewis has selected the following themes for 2020:

October 21 - November 10	(21 - day plan)	Mercy
November 11 - December 1	(21 - day plan)	Bearing Fruit
December 2 - December 23	(21 - day plan)	Cares of the World
December 24 - January 13	(21 - day plan)	Rest

There are 18 plans to cover this year. Each is 21 days long. Start at the beginning and work through the year (and a few days into January 2021). Challenge yourself to study the Bible and strengthen your faith in the process.

#### Tips on reading the Bible daily:

- Start reading the Bible today.
- Set aside a specific time and place each day. Set your schedule and then stick to it. Mornings are great, but feel free to use any time that works consistently in your schedule.
- Get a good study Bible to help illuminate the meaning of the original Hebrew, Aramaic, and Greek text
- Choose a translation to use during your reading.
- Say a short prayer to God before you begin, asking the Holy Spirit to give you wisdom and understanding.
- Dive in and enjoy the richness of God's Word! Apply God's Word to your life. Bible study should be practiced and applicable. These seven steps will help you begin a journey to becoming a "lifelong learner" of God's Word.

#### Harrisonburg District Finance Committee Announcement

We are happy to report that the Harrisonburg District is currently doing well financially. We applied for the Paycheck Protection Program loan (PPP) and obtained it. We now feel very comfortable offering one month waived on your District Apportionments, if eleven months have been paid in full. For those congregations that have already paid 100% of your District Apportionments and would like a refund, you should contact the District office, no later than December 1, 2020. You need to continue to move/pay toward making 100% of the priority 1 Conference Apportionments as shown on you monthly statement. amount of our space in our loaner closet. If you have a clean, dry space where we can store these, please let me know. FYI: we have around 30 beds loaned out and presently have around 10 in our closet for those who may need them. If you or someone you know needs one, they can be picked up at our present location and I can show you how to set one up. We are not delivering these presently due to COVID. We ask that you wear a mask and practice physical distancing when coming to Mission Central. Thank you to all who have helped make this mission possible in our community and we continue to seek volunteers as well as your continued support with prayers and donations.



Incarnation: Rediscovering the Significance of Christmas by Adam Hamilton, 2020.

This new Adam Hamilton Advent Study just arrived from Cokesbury and is being rushed to our District Library shelves – Check it Out!

His parents gave him the name Jesus. But the prophets, the shepherds, the wise men, and the angels addressed him by other names. They called him Lord, Messiah, Savior, Emmanuel, Light of the World, and Word Made Flesh.

In *Incarnation: Rediscovering the Significance of Christmas*, Adam Hamilton examines the names of Christ used by the gospel writers, exploring the historical and personal significance of his birth. In the face of uncertainty and conflict, this Advent season your congregation can reclaim the Christ Child who brings us together, heals our hearts, and calls us to bring light into the darkness. *Incarnation* is a stand-a-lone book, but works beautifully as a four-week Bible study experience perfect for all age groups during the Advent season. The Library has the hard cover book (available also in paperback at Amazon), Leader Guide, DVD, Youth Study Book and Children's leader Guide, and can be found in the Bible/ Bible Studies **section** (top two shelves) of the Library.

Be sure to read the latest update on the Technical Assistance Manual (TAM) - updated on October 21, 2020. The Return to In-Person Worship Work Group, established by Bishop Lewis, placed three new documents on its conference web page including a modest revision to the Technical Assistance Manual. www.vaumc.org

This is now the fourth revision since the TAM's initial release in June. The three significant changes in this version include:

1) a provision for the use of paper bulletins when they are placed by masked and gloved volunteers 24 hours before the service,

2) guidance for Sunday school classes that want to meet at times adjacent to worship, and 3) a clarification on distancing seating in pews to ensure 6 feet of separation.

In addition, the Work Group has posted guidelines for recording and streaming sessions to encourage best practices in these settings. Also, there are some new ventilation recommendations.

The Work Group continues to meet regularly to review and consider revisions based on the feedback of United Methodists from all across Virginia. #### **Bankruptcy Process Documents for Boy Scouts of America**

**UPDATED October 28, 2020** — On October 26, 2020, the Conference sent out an email and a number of documents associated with the Boy Scouts of America ("BSA") bankruptcy process. Today, Bishop Lewis is providing additional guidance with the advice of the Conference Chancellor and various forms have been revised. Importantly, on October 27, 2020, CFA voted to approve the funds necessary to cover the legal expenses associated with the filing of the initial Proof of Claim by every

local church if that local church has now or has ever had a charter with the BSA. Remember, if the local church wants to work with the Bradley Firm, the local church needs to complete the documents mentioned in Bishop Lewis' letter and return those documents, via email, to <u>bsa@vaumc.org</u> no later than November 2, 2020.
