

From Your District Lay Leader Andy Harbick

There's a good chance that you have heard a line from a wonderful poem by Mary Oliver called "The Summer Day". It goes like this:

Tell me, what is it you plan to do with your one wild and precious life?

You probably heard it in a sermon or an inspirational speech or saw it painted in script on the wall at a coffee shop. Maybe this is the first time you've ever heard it. How does it make you feel? Do you hear it as a call to action with the emphasis on the word "do?" And does the hanging question about "your one wild and precious life" nudge you towards action, to take risks, and to make the most of the time you've been given? Me, too. I'm an easy mark for an inspirational message. But about a year ago I found myself reading the whole poem for the first time and I realized that that lesson is completely missing the point.



Who made the world?
Who made the swan, and the black bear?
Who made the grasshopper?
This grasshopper, I mean—
the one who has flung herself out of the grass,
the one who is eating sugar out of my hand,
who is moving her jaws back and forth instead of up and down—
who is gazing around with her enormous and complicated eyes.
Now she lifts her pale forearms and thoroughly washes her face.
Now she snaps her wings open, and floats away.
I don't know exactly what a prayer is.
I do know how to pay attention, how to fall down
into the grass, how to kneel down in the grass,
how to be idle and blessed, how to stroll through the fields,
which is what I have been doing all day.
Tell me, what else should I have done?
Doesn't everything die at last, and too soon?
Tell me, what is it you plan to do
with your one wild and precious life?

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I think Mary's poem is a gentle rebuttal to a world that values productivity above almost all else. Imagine her poem as a conversation with a friend who asks, "What did you do today?" After sharing how she pondered the deep questions of creation and delighted in the tiny mysteries of a grasshopper her friend says, "Yeah, but what did you DO?" She takes a breath and recounts that she doesn't know what prayer is but that she has paid attention, fallen into the grass, knelt, been blessed, and strolled all day. She then turns the questions back on her friend, "Tell me, what should I have done? Doesn't everything die at last, and too soon?"

And so, we return to our inspirational quote, "Tell me, what is it you plan to do with your one wild and precious life?" It lands a lot differently now doesn't it? She has tutored us to see the world with new eyes and have an entirely different posture towards it. I believe the poem is calling us towards patience, attentiveness, peace, delight, and gratitude... prayer. So my encouragement for you today is that you pause, put away your to do list or the things that are worrying you, find your "grasshopper" (or listen to Mary read her poem https://bit.ly/thesummerday), and delight in the blessings that surround you.

What is Truth?



³⁷ "You are a king, then!" said Pilate. Jesus answered, "You say that I am a king. In fact, the reason I was born and came into the world is to testify to the truth. Everyone on the side of truth listens to me." "What is truth?" retorted Pilate. With this he went out again to the Jews gathered there and said, "I find no basis for a charge against him."

John 18: 37-38

This scene of Jesus standing along side Pilate, battered and bleeding from a Roman beating...with the Hebrew hierarchy lurking nearby in the shadows, is one I carry in my mind and spirit to inspire me of not only the courage of Jesus to face down those who would crush the will of God, but also the awkward position and even the honor of this Roman Governor of Jerusalem attempting to do the right


thing in spite of the unruly crowd before him. This one testimony, "What is truth?" is a question that rings for all of us to answer, faithfully and in good conscience.

As I am sure you, my brothers and sisters in the faith, are called daily to answer that very same question from inquisitors of every stripe, on a variety of challenging issues, both theological and societal. Some would throw a scripture quote to prove their point, while others would create a maze of the connected and supposed, woven together to prove their point. Here truth can be illusive, and like Pilate, I ask "What is truth?" I try hard to not try to prove my own views but listen for the answers blowing freely in the wind, yet at some point I need to seek comfort in my own thoughts and convictions.

In this regard, the Wesley Quadrilateral has proven useful (with apologies to John Wesley and Thomas Hooker and those devotees of the Book of Discipline ¶105 Section 4 for my interpretation); What do the Scriptures say? What do the Traditions of the church teach us? What does our personal experience reveal? and finally, What do you think?

The traditionalists among us would eagerly call for decisions based on the black and white of the wording of the Scriptures and the past traditions of old; while the free thinkers would argue the variations of translation and culture of the author and breaking of these ancient traditions by no less that the Christ himself in the same Scripture.

"All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that every man or woman of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work." 2 Timothy 3:16



We can either assume everything in the scripture is absolute truth as written to be followed without hesitation or question, or we can choose to believe that none of it stands in truth without verification of our times and culture. The Scriptures do not have to be the absolute truth to be useful in teaching the Way of the Cross. Surely the word of God can withstand the eager inquiry of this sinner. My quest for Christian Perfection would require and demand no less a chase for enlightenment.

So I turn to John Wesley once again for answers. In *The Character of a Methodist*, Brother Jack calls on the primacy of Scripture to guide us all, but writes, "We believe Christ to be the eternal, supreme God.....But as to all opinions which do not strike at the root of Christianity, we think and let think." Now the question for this Truth seeker, what is the root of Christianity? Is it only the teachings of Christ, all of the teachings, tenets, healings and stories of the New Testament, or the entire content of the Bible?

So we, once again, come face to face with stumbling blocks to reconciliation...too much information and judgmental opinion, and not enough Jesus Christ. If you were looking for an answer to the riddle of what is Truth when you started this read, I failed you and Pilate. But I think I better understand the question that Pilate asked to Jesus...I don't have an answer, but I understand the frustration of Pilate as he stood before the unruly mob in Jerusalem.

As for my answer to the question of *"the root of Christianity"*, the ancient affirmation of **The Apostle's Creed** (UMH#881) will do just nicely....and on second thought, we have the answer to what is Truth.....So Be It.



MISSION CENTRAL CHILDREN'S CLOTHES CLOSET

The year is flying by and many of our clients are already back in school. We have been busy! In July alone, we signed up nine new families, had 96 client visits and gave out 3,500 diapers and more than 500 pull-ups. We have registered a total of 56 new families in 2021 to date.



In late September and early October, we will spend our workdays transitioning the clothes closet from spring/summer clothes to fall/winter clothes. We have been stocking for winter throughout the year and are in pretty good shape! We will let you know when we have shortages in certain items, for those who are interested in donating.

We have many expectant mothers coming in, so we appreciate all the beautiful quilts and blankets that have been donated. We put them in a special baby goody bag for each new baby, and the parents are thrilled! Thanks to all for your time and generosity – it means more than you could ever know.

Equipment for Caring at Mission Central

Hello and I hope you have enjoyed your summer. We have felt a little freer, but please know we still need to be cautious to protect our health and the health of those around us. School will have started by the time you read this letter, and thankfully our children will now be able to attend school in-person in the buildings. Masks are an important part of being safe.

We have continued to loan out medical equipment and have received generous donations of this kind, as well as money to buy needed supplies. This mission depends on the generosity and gifts you offer. During July, we loaned out 11 shower chairs, 5 shower benches, 5 bedside commodes, as well as 5 walkers, 6 rollators and canes, to name a few. Can you believe we received our 49th hospital bed in August? Most of these are out in individual homes and I know some we will not be seeing again, but they are being used. All the beds that have been loaned are donations from persons in the community. Thank you for your generosity! Persons still are needing and using wound care supplies, colostomy bags and adult diapers and pull-ups.

You and your church may soon be hearing more about what is going on at Mission Central as Dawn Kern from Bridge-water UMC is going out to share information about our mission, what we do and how you can help and possibly glean ideas you may have to make this more serviceable to our community. Thanks to Dawn for her willingness to do this!

- Get a good study Bible to help illuminate the meaning of the original Hebrew, Aramaic, and Greek text.
- Choose a translation to use during your reading.
- Say a short prayer to God before you begin, asking the Holy Spirit to give you wisdom and understanding.
- Dive in and enjoy the richness of God's Word! Apply God's Word to your life.

Bible study should be practiced and applicable. These seven steps will help you begin a journey to becoming a "lifelong learner" of God's Word.
