

From the District Director of Congregational Vitality Gordon Meriwether:

My Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

First let me say that I am honored and blessed to answer this call of Vitality among the people of God in the Harrisonburg District. I know the hand of God was present in bringing me to this mighty call!

I began my work career as a teenager selling men's clothes in the local Belk Department Store in Montgomery, Alabama. There I learned that establishing trusting relationships with your customers was critical to any successful sale. I hope you won't consider me too crass if I offer that building those bonds of trust in Christ's presence, whether at the front door of the church or in the community at large, is also the first step in bringing congregational vitality into our church communities. This calling is not just of the pastor or the lay leader or committee chairs, but of every believing soul that ventures forth from our church into community of the needy and



unchurched. Building such a team is paramount to establishing a robust, open and loving community of believers, who willingly present their bodies and their presence as a living sacrifice, a new creation, willing to go wherever, and make disciples of whomever. If such a band of believers is built there is no way we can't grow into vital congregations across the district and throughout the Commonwealth to take the word of God to places unimagined.

You will all get to know, if you don't already, that I am a traveler. I will be contacting each church to begin visits and discussions on your needs and how I can be of assistance infusing a new vitality into the church community.

Congregational In closing, let me share a conversation I had with the Superintendent on my first day. The gist was that I am not to be primarily the staff assistant to the Superintendent, but rather to work with each of you to build on the presence of Triune God in our church community, to find the bubbling spring of Vitality and Grace that will grow to a mighty sea of righteousness and spread the truth of Jesus Christ.

What Are We Gonna Do?



We are rapidly approaching the Liturgical Season of Advent—the time of preparation to celebrate the birth of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. The question I would like to consider is what preparations should we make to celebrate the birth of Jesus? We decorate our churches - and few things are as beautiful as an Advent-decorated Church. And if you all are like my family, we also decorate our homes and depending on where you might work outside the home, you may even be able to decorate there, too.

As important as these physical preparations are, even more important is how we prepare spiritually to celebrate and announce the birth of Jesus. That is what I'd like to briefly discuss today—what are we gonna do to let the world know, not only that Jesus is born, but also his life, atoning sacrifice on the cross for our sins, his resurrection and promise to come back for us?

The events surrounding the birth of Jesus are recorded in two Gospels: Matthew, Chapters 1 and 2, and Luke, Chapters 1 and 2. The Gospel of Mark does not mention Jesus' birth at all and John's Gospel has only a passing reference in verse 1:14, "the Word became flesh and made His dwelling among us. . ."

Other than Jesus being born in Bethlehem, there is very little repetition in the two stories. This isn't necessarily surprising because the Gospel of Matthew was written primarily to the nation of Israel and emphasizes Jesus' fulfillment of God's promises to Abraham. Luke's Gospel was written primarily to the Greeks and emphasizes Jesus' role as Savior to all people.

Jesus' birth, as detailed in these two accounts, is the same event but from two very different perspectives. But both narratives are necessary to the complete understanding of the story of the Nativity. It has always struck me as very interesting to whom the news of Jesus' birth was delivered and the various responses that are recorded to this glorious news.

In Luke's account we have the birth of John the Baptist, the Angel Gabriel's visit to Mary, Jesus' birth in the stable, the angelic proclamation of Jesus' birth to the shepherds and a few days later, encounters with Simeon and Anna at the temple. Luke also traces Jesus' lineage through King David for <u>both</u> Joseph and Mary. Mary's lineage is the critical lineage in the story as Jesus had no earthly father.

Matthew's account includes the story of Joseph and his obedience to God accepting Mary as his wife, even through she was pregnant. Matthew also details the visit of the Wise Men. Their visit probably occurred sometime after Jesus' birth because from Matthew 2:11, we learn the Wise Men visited Jesus in a house. The timing of the Wise Men's visit after Jesus' birth is the reason that the church celebrates Epiphany, or the coming of the Wise Men, after Christmas.

From Matthew's account, we know Herod and all of Jerusalem were "disturbed" with the news of the Messiah's birth as announced by the Wise Men on their arrival in Jerusalem.

It is interesting to see who responded to this information. **Mary's** response to Angel Gabriel's news of her upcoming pregnancy is found in Luke 1:38, "I am the Lord's servant, may it be to me as you have said."

Joseph was noted as a 'righteous man' (Matthew 1:19) and obeyed God and didn't divorce Mary. He then married her and was the one who named Jesus - also in obedience to God.

The **shepherds** from around Bethlehem heard the angelic proclamation, and once they got over being terrified, went to the manger and responded 'joyfully' - and on their way back to their sheep they told everyone what they had seen and heard.

The Wise Men traveled all the way from what is modern day Iran and 'bowed down and worshipped Him' (Matthew 2:11).

Herod responded by having all the young boys in and around Bethlehem killed (Matthew 2:16). This act was part of the Flight to Egypt drama that occurred after Jesus' birth.

Simeon and Anna (Luke 2:25-38) both prophesied and glorified God when they saw the baby Jesus in the temple.

In the Biblical accounts, no one else is recorded as having responded to the news of Jesus' birth - not even the religious leaders of the time. . .

It would behoove us <u>all</u> to consider how we intend to respond this year to the glorious news of Jesus' birth. What Are We Gonna Do? I think the essence of what our response can be is found in the refrain of the great Christmas song from the Church's African American heritage, "Go Tell It On The Mountain":

Go, tell it on the mountain, over the hills and everywhere.

Go, tell it on the mountain, that Jesus Christ is born.

(But don't forget to tell it down in the Valley, too - in Singers Glen, Toms Brook, Crimora, Stanley, McGaheysville - well, you get the idea. . .)

Marquetta and I hope and pray that everyone has a joyous and blessed Christmastide - always remembering that "Jesus is the reason for the Season."

> New Playlist: Hearing Jesus in a Noisy World By Jacob Armstrong, 2018

Whether we know it or not, we are living with a playlist. Caused by schedule overload and multiple distractions, the playlist sounds like this: You have to do everything. You have to say, "ves" to everything. You are supposed to be in all places at all times.

Jesus give us a different playlist. It says: You are supposed to do two things: love God and love your neighbor. Saying no is often the best yes. You can only be in one place at a time. This book addresses the anxiety, distraction addiction, and schedule overload that result from listening to the world's playlist and gives us permission to hear and live by Jesus' words.

The District Library has all the components for a six-week study including the book, a DVD featuring author and pastor Jacob Armstrong, and a comprehensive Leader Guide.


