From Your District Superintendent:

"For a child has been born for us, a son given to us; authority rests upon his shoulders; and he is named Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace."

- Isaiah 9:6 (NRSV)

Last year I reflected upon the word <u>Advent</u>, which means *coming*. But what is coming? The Advent wreath contains five candles. There are three purple candles, one pink and a white candle in the center of the wreath.

Each candle is lit each Sunday of the Advent season in preparation of the birth of Jesus Christ on Christmas Eve. The first purple candle represents *Hope*.

The second purple candle is the candle of *Peace*. It is sometimes called the Bethlehem Candle, which reminds us of the place in which preparations were made to receive and cradle the Christ child.

The third candle is pink and it is the candle of *Joy*. It reminds of the joy that Mary felt when the angel Gabriel told her that a special child would be born to her; a child who would save and deliver God's people.

The fourth candle is purple, which is the candle of *Love*. This light is meant to remind us of the love that God has for us. Jesus shows us God's perfect love. He is God's love in human form. The Bible says in John 3:16 that "God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life."

Then, on Christmas Eve, we light the white candle in the center, which is known as the Christ candle, and reminds us that Christ is born, but not only that Christ was born in Bethlehem some 2,000 years ago, but that Christ is born in each of our hearts.

So what is *coming* during Advent? Many times it goes over our heads and we miss it all together. What is *coming* is not the gifts we will give or receive. What is *coming* is not Santa Claus. What is *coming* is not the singing of Christmas carols. What is *coming* is the birth of Jesus. We celebrate Jesus and His birthday.

So with that in mind, let us keep Christ in Christmas as we feed the hungry, clothe the naked, forgive the guilty, welcome the stranger or the unwanted, care for the ill, love our enemies, and do unto others as you would have done unto you.

In the last few months, I invited you all to join me in spiritual disciplines such as fasting, prayer, Scripture reading, etc. For this month, I invite you to join me and do at least one of the following: visit someone in the hospital; visit someone in prison; offer breaking bread with someone in need; offer water to someone who is thirsty; pray for those who try to harm you; offer a jacket to someone on the street who does not have one. Let us together, as the Harrisonburg District, be the hands and feet of Jesus.

Jesus is all around us. So let us take the time to enjoy Jesus' company and together celebrate Christmas with Christ.



"Come follow me." Jesus said, "and I will make you fishers of men (and women)." Mark 1:17



The Jesus Gang

Jesus answered his calling at the ripe old age of 30, an age that according to Roman records surpassed the average life expectance of a Palestinian male by one year. This Jesus was living on the backside of life when he walked away from his family responsibilities and into the desert to begin his call to ministry. Led by the Spirit into the desert to encounter the dark side with all its temptations of worldliness, greed, and ego, Jesus emerged some 40 days later, initiated into purpose and drive.

His life was now that of a prophet, the anointed one, called to free humanity from the sin and destitution. But unlike the ancient Holy men that had gone before, this Jesus first set about assembling the 12, a neighborhood gang, if you will. Why did he not face the ministry alone, but rather formed this small group of disciples to be trained as "Apostles" . . . the Jesus Gang?

I would like to think that in the Grace of God, he knew that to fulfill the tasks ahead he would need others in counsel and support, after all, Messiah or not, his human legacy was that of a poor carpenter from a nowhere town called Nazareth. Facing the human complexities of life in faraway Jerusalem would take a group effort, even for the Messiah. So this Gang was chosen, not of the elite and worldly, but mostly of the hardworking dismissed poor. . .the dregs of life. These 12 would wander the fields, towns, villages and even the streets of Jerusalem, to learn from their Master the ways and wisdom of salvation, to hear his teachings of the freedom of God's Grace.



My Brothers and Sisters, the journey of this Gang was not about the walk with Jesus, but rather about the preparation for the future. As Jesus taught and they listened, the Apostles learned the foundation of Truth that would conquer the world. Jesus prepared them for the day of his departure, for the presence of the Spirit, to go out into the world and form other gangs who would spread his message throughout the humankind.

Today, as we form our Spirit-led Gangs to build our ministry in small groups, may we be inspired by the lessons and example of the Christ, may we remember our call to bring believers to this Jesus Gang through the Water and the Spirit, may we teach these disciples the Wisdom and the Way of the Jesus Gang, so they may bring others to the call and the purpose of the Christ. Amen

So may I ask you, as a disciple of this Christ, have you formed a Jesus Gang lately? No time like the present. So Be It.

The Best Christmas Present Ever


Depending on when you read this part of the Harrisonburg District Newsletter, we are either getting ready to start or have just started the season of Advent (December 1st is the First Sunday in Advent). As usual, I am still trying to get meaningful presents for my family. I

am on a never-ending, constant quest to be able to give the best Christmas presents ever to each of my loved ones. Kathy and I are in a 'blended marriage': between us we have four children and five grandchildren and one small dog – our children collectively have four dogs and two cats.

This quest has me thinking what can I do to give the baby Jesus for a present this year? Looking at the original Christmas story, we have a mixed bag of responses. The Wise Men came from a far away place and presented their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. The shepherds just showed up as they were, but joyously, announced Jesus' birth to the little town of Bethlehem. The Angelic hosts gave the first ever flash-mob concert that quite literally, rose to the highest heavens. Even in fiction, we have gifts given: The Little Drummer Boy gave the only thing he had - he played his drum. King Herod's present was one of the most evil presents ever given.

We all can show our gratitude to the Risen Jesus, by "Loving God and Loving our neighbors as ourself" (Mark 12:30-31). Jesus has already given us His gift: He died for each and every human that has ever existed, exists now or will exist in the future. I am not sure that Jesus wants big presents: what He wants is for us to follow Him to the Father. if I were a Wise Man, I would do my part;
Yet what I can I give him: [I] give [Him] my heart.

I am pretty sure God expects nothing more from us than for us to follow His Son, but most-certainly He expects nothing less! This is without a doubt the best Christmas present ever to Jesus.


