From Your District Superintendent

"His lord said to him, 'Well done, good and faithful servant; you were faithful over a few things, I will make you ruler over many things.

Enter into the joy of your lord." – Matthew 25:21

As I am writing these words, I think of the many people all over the world that have passed away, especially the unexpected deaths due to illness, an accident, a tragedy, and COVID-19. I also pray and think of the grief and acknowledge our human loss. I pray that God grant us grace, that in pain we may find comfort, in sorrow hope, and in death resurrection. The promise of the resurrection is tangible as we live it in Jesus Christ.



Clergy and laity alike often asked the question: Why God would take the life of a young person? It is a difficult question to answer. So instead of providing an answer, I want to share with you a story written by Rabi Aaron Moss as he was asked this same question, and he pondered it. This story helped me to have a different perspective.

"A great debate once raged in heaven. It was over a most beautiful and precious new soul that God had created. The angels debated what should be done with this soul. One group of angels demanded that this soul remain in heaven. "She is too pure, too holy to face the ugliness of the lowly world," they said. "Who knows what will happen to her in a world of temptation and evil. This soul must stay with us here."

But the other group of angels said the exact opposite: "Indeed this soul glows with a unique divine glow. But for that very reason she must go down to earth. For imagine the beauty and goodness this soul can bring to a dark world. What good is there in keeping such a soul in heaven? Let her descend to earth and shine her light there."

And so they argued back and forth, each side unshakable in their view. Until it became clear that they could not resolve the issue themselves, they needed a Higher Authority. The case was brought before God Almighty. The angels stated their arguments before the heavenly court. God listened to the two opinions; the first group of angels arguing that this unspoiled soul is too holy to be plunged into the lowly world, while the second countering that the world needs such souls more than anything.

And this was God's response: "Indeed, it is sad to send such an immaculate soul into such a dark world. I created souls like this one so that darkness can be transformed into light. The whole purpose of creation was that the lowly world be refined by the good deeds of mortal human beings. This cannot be achieved by souls in heaven. It can only be achieved through souls in bodies. And so even this pure soul must descend to earth."

The first group of angels, who requested for the soul to remain in heaven, were disappointed. They couldn't fathom how such a spiritual being could be expected to survive such a physical world. God turned to them and said, "As for your request to keep this soul up here, I will grant it partially. Though she must leave us and go down to earth, it will not be long before she will return to us. Her sojourn on earth will be brief. Such a brilliant soul will not need long to fulfil her mission. Soon she will be free to come back to heaven."

Every day that she is on earth is a blessing. God then turned to the second group and asked, "Are you satisfied with that? Do you accept that this soul can only be on earth for a limited time?"

The angels replied, "Yes we do. Every day that she is on earth is a blessing."

During times of uncertainty such as now, I wake up each morning and pray for safety and protection, but especially I pray for guidance in seeking God's will. When a loved one passes away, we feel we have lost someone precious. We are left with a gaping hole in our heart, and we often wonder why they were taken away from us. But at the same time we can be grateful for the fact that they were able to be together. We are blessed to have such beautiful souls in our lives. The world is privileged to have such heavenly guests come down on earth. And even if it can only be for a short while, we will take whatever we can get.

I am thankful to God for the gift of every day.


Every day on Earth is a Blessing

A challenge to Read the Bible in 2020

Bible Readings for September

Bishop Lewis has been encouraging clergy and laity of the Virginia Conference to read the Bible in a year since 2017. Each year has featured a different way of reading: 2017 read the Bible straight through; 2018 read the Bible chronologically; 2019 read the Bible in a blended style, a mixture of Old Testament readings and New Testament each day. For 2020, Bishop Lewis is challenging the entire conference to read the Bi-



ble all the way through with a thematic reading plan. The thematic plan is found on www.intentionalbygrace.com and Bishop Lewis has selected the following themes for 2020:

(21 - day plan)	Trust
(21 - day plan)	Mercy
(21 - day plan)	Bearing Fruit
(21 - day plan)	Cares of the World
(21 - day plan)	Rest

There are 18 plans to cover this year. Each is 21 days long. Start at the beginning and work through the year (and a few days into January 2021). In this new year, challenge yourself to study the Bible and strengthen your faith in the process.


Tips on reading the Bible daily:

- * Start reading the Bible today.
- * Set aside a specific time and place each day. Set your schedule and then stick to it.

 Mornings are great, but feel free to use any time that works consistently in your schedule.
- * Get a good study Bible to help illuminate the meaning of the original Hebrew, Aramaic, and Greek text
- * Choose a translation to use during your reading.
- Say a short prayer to God before you begin, asking the Holy Spirit to give you wisdom and understanding.
- Dive in and enjoy the richness of God's Word! Apply God's Word to your life. Bible study should be practiced and applicable. These seven steps will help you begin a journey to becoming a "lifelong learner" of God's Word.


Spiritual Food For Thought — If there is a silver lining in this 6 month pandemic it is this: It isn't a question of whether the 'old things' were working, but the stark reality that a lot of the old things are not possible under this Covid-19 pandemic. What old things? Singing in church, Communion from a common cup, close quarter fellowship (hugging, hand shaking, etc.) We all have been forced to go to alternate plan B to conduct worship — and congregations have made decisions based on what is best for them. In some instances, individual churches on a Charge are worshipping differently. Remember, the operative word is 'Worship'.

Some churches have used on-line resources – Zoom, Facebook, etc. to worship. Others have broadcast the live services over low-wattage FM channels on the radio. Others have Drive-Up services, socially distanced In-Person services (with masks). Still others have recorded worship and made them available through a variety of delivery methods. A lot of these choices are driven by the physical resources that are available. Looking back on this incredible amount of diversity in delivery methods, my 'ah-ha' moment was when I wondered out loud, "Why has it taken a pandemic to force our delivery methods to diversify?"

One of the memorable lines out of the movie "Field of Dreams" was the comment, "If you build it, they will come." In or-

ganized religion, we are continuing to disprove that conventional wisdom. We are reverting back to an updated model that Jesus and the early disciples used – meet people where they already are meeting (i. e. Jesus at the well with the Samaritan women, Paul in Athens, etc.) and meet them at their point of need (everywhere). Churches send missionaries to foreign lands, what's stopping us from sending missionaries into our cities and towns? Could it be merely semantics? Is there really a difference between missionary vs. local outreach?

I am continually awed by the variety of ways our local churches are seeing local needs and then doing something to meet that need. For example, one local church prepared personal 'gift bags' with protective equipment to the entire staff and five ad-



This is the ideal time to try something 'new' in attitude, delivery and focus. We all are, and should be, ministers.

Walk humbly with God; walk gently with your neighbor; and be at peace with yourself.

Christmas is coming and Kingsway Prison and Family Outreach needs your help more than ever. Hopefully this year the inmate paste and Christmas card. We are going to have to

purchase our notepads and lip balm this year, so we will need financial donations to cover the cost of 6,000 of those and we will welcome collections of toothpaste. We only need 4,000 tubes of 6 ounce or less toothpaste. Dollar Tree has the toothpaste for \$1. General Dollar also has some at \$1. The inmates really like Colgate and Crest because they aren't on their commissary lists. We have already started collecting toothpaste and pencils.

The Covid pandemic has made ministry at Kingsway a challenge. We have not been allowed to go into any of the facilities to do Bible Studies or Church, but we have been sending devotions to all the inmates that were attending any of our programs each month since the lockdown; over 500 mailed.

The Apple Tree project, gifts for children of the inmates, also needs help as many of the churches that have

been doing the project are not having church or don't feel like they can participate.

WHAT WE HEARD:

The August, 2020 Virginia Conference TAM Survey

347 laity and 417 clergy completed the survey.

About **50%** of churches are in rural areas, about **36%** are in the suburbs and about **14%** are in the cities.

Most churches who responded that they are worshipping indicated that they are worshipping online, with in-person indoors being second and drive-in worship being third.

About 40% of churches who responded indicated they are having in-person gatherings other than worship.

Before COVID, about 36% of churches represented in the survey worshipped with 50 or less people. Around 40% worshipped with 51-150, about 14% worshipped 150-300, and about 10% worshipped with 300 or more people.

Most churches are currently **not celebrating**Holy Communion, although the majority who
are are doing so are celebrating the
sacrament during indoor worship.

About 40% of respondents say the TAM is easy to understand, while about 48% said this is sometimes true. About ten percent disagreed. Over 90% of respondents indicated they have been able to have questions answered by their District Superintendent.

"Amazing Grace" received the most votes for favorite hymn.

When it comes to the amount of communications you receive from the Conference regarding returning to worship, 82% of laity and 92% of clergy say you receive enough.

About **70%** of respondents indicated their church(es) had an online presence before COVID.

Over 72% of churches have added a new online/virtual presence since COVID began.

You also told us that these are a lot of rules to follow, and that this has definitely not been easy for you. The documents are seen as strict, long, and complicated, especially when requirements are changed, which seems to happen often. You miss in-person fellowship, sacraments, service, and study, and you definitely do not like wearing masks. Implementing the TAM requires several volunteers each Sunday. Some churches have a difficult time with online gatherings because of limited availability of technology, and you very, very, much wish to SING.



Bind us together with the unity of God's love.


Restore oneness to the family of God.
